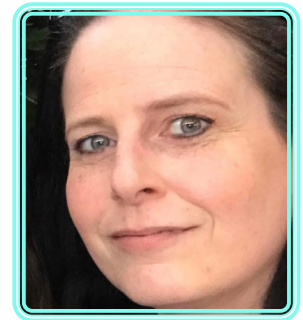

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We Are Covenantal . . . Not Creedal

We welcome all who wish to be in covenant with us. Unitarian Universalism embodies religious freedom. We do not provide the answers to life's great questions. Instead, we provide a beloved community in which individuals, working together and alone, are encouraged to find answers that are meaningful in the context of their own lives. We embrace the values of Unitarian Universalism.

As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love.

Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

Inseparable from one another, these **shared values** are:

Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence. We cherish Earth and all beings by creating and nurturing relationships of care and respect.

Pluralism. We are all sacred beings diverse in culture, experience, and theology. We covenant to learn from

one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

Justice. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive and dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression.

Transformation. We adapt to the changing world. We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically.

Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

Equity. Every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and worthiness. We covenant to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.

The Chalice

The flaming chalice is the primary symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith. Congregations light it in gatherings and worship. The words we say together when we light our chalice are: "With hope to make this a better world, we light this flame. Its light is a symbol of the power of love."



We Have a Rich History



We Are Unitarian Universalists: Our Denomination



Unitarian Universalism inspires change in ourselves and the world.

We live our faith through acts centered on UUA values. Our diverse and inclusive tradition promotes these values through worship, learning, connection, service, and social justice.

Formed in 1961 from the union of the Universalists (1793) and Unitarians (1825), Unitarian Universalism traces our roots back to liberal religious pioneers in England, Poland, Transylvania, and early America. Today, UUs embrace diverse beliefs, united by shared values and a commitment to creating positive change.



We Are UCBR: Our Congregation

Known as “the church with the big circle window” and “the church that shows up,” we have a rich history dating back to 1951.



Early gatherings took place in locations ranging from the Heidelberg Hotel to the Old State Capitol basement. In 1965, the Unitarian Fellowship of Baton Rouge was established on its current site and became a church as membership and support grew. Today, with about 400 members, we continue to thrive, emerging strong from ministerial transitions and the challenges of the pandemic.



We Are Self-Governing

We value freedom of the pulpit and operate with congregational polity, self-governed while in covenant with other UU congregations to support the UUA. Since transitioning to policy governance in 2014-2016, our elected Board of Trustees oversees mission, vision, strategy, and the responsible stewardship of resources. Ministry encompasses the daily work of building community, managing resources, and transforming lives, led by the Ministry Team Leader, Rev. Nathan Ryan, and supported by Rev. Meredith Barber, staff, and volunteers. The Board sets annual ministry priorities through the Annual Vision of Ministry (AVOM).



Annual Vision of Ministry 2024-2025

Each day the ministry of the church should continue to serve the purpose and mission of the church. The 2026-2027 AVM is under development. In the 2025-2026 board year, the ministry team's priority was to:

1. Provide a spiritual home of safety, stability, and hope, and a refuge where we practice radical hospitality.
2. Remove the barriers and oppressions that obstruct engagement, inclusion, and spiritual enrichment.
3. Equip our congregants with the spiritual tools we need for broader spiritual exploration, for engagement in advocacy, and for putting forth a strong example of Unitarian Universalist values in our community.

Governance upholds bylaws, mission statements, policies, and strategic goals. Ministry brings worship, programming, generosity, faith formation, service projects, welcoming, engagement, and building care to life.



We Practice Preemptive Radical Hospitality

We are a diverse, multicultural, beloved community of communities.



For over seventy-five years, our church has championed diversity and civil rights. Rooted in white Protestant New England congregational Christianity, this congregation was founded as an integrated community in a segregated South. While majority white, it has always included people of diverse backgrounds.

In recent years, we've deepened our commitment to inclusivity. Our board has prioritized racial reconciliation in the Annual Vision of Ministry for the past five years, encouraging staff and lay leaders to focus on this critical work. Groups within our church



examine how racism and oppression impact our congregation and broader society.

Our Social Justice Team supports participation in Dialogue on Race, a Baton Rouge-wide curriculum on institutional racism, while the Black Joy Collective creates space for Black UUs to explore their experiences. Through Together Baton Rouge, we address systemic issues like economic segregation, educational inequities, and housing access.

We strive to build a beloved community where all cultures are equally valued.



We welcome people of all sexual orientations and sexual identities.

We are recognized by the Unitarian Universalist Association as a Welcoming Congregation, affirming and including LGBTQIA+ people as vital members of our worship, programs, and social life.

As a Welcoming Congregation, we pledge to:

- Honor all lives and affirm caring and affection regardless of sexual orientation.
- Celebrate diversity with inclusive language and worship.
- Incorporate LGBTQIA+ experiences into all programs, including religious education.
- Affirm and celebrate LGBTQIA+ issues, history, and marriage equality.
- Conduct same-sex weddings and advocate for justice, freedom, and equality in society.
- Speak out when LGBTQIA+ rights and dignity are at stake.



We remain committed to learning and deepening our understanding of LGBTQIA+ lives and experiences.



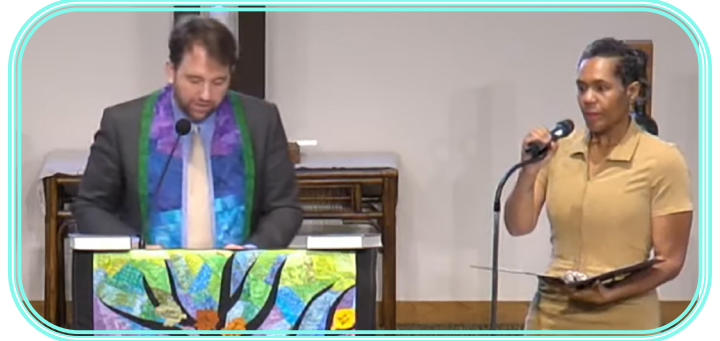

Worship-Related Teams

Worship Guild

Rooted in Unitarian Universalist tradition, the Worship Guild cultivates meaningful worship to make the world a better place. Meeting monthly with worship staff, the guild supports services by sharing readings, preparing for holidays, and directing special services like the annual sharing of faith stories.



Treehouse Team



Named for their location high above the sanctuary, this volunteer team manages the technical and electronic systems that enable worship. From audio-visuals to internet, telecoil hearing loops, and lighting, they ensure seamless in-person and online services, including the transition to multi-platform worship during the pandemic.



Music Program



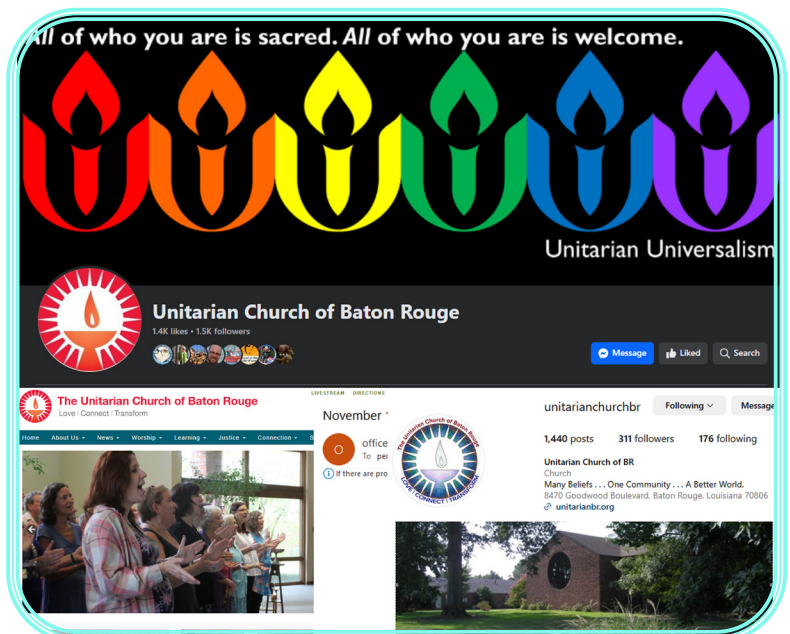
Our music program enriches church services with instrumental and vocal ensembles, as well as soloists, led by Lee Hartman and Trey Davis. The choir welcomes all willing to learn, with practices on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. Other ensembles form as needed.



Communications Staff

The Communications Staff oversees the church's website, calendar, email communications, Zoom reservations, YouTube live chats, street signage, and Sunday service slides. This team includes staff and congregation members with digital communications expertise.

Family Ministries

What is Family Ministry?

Family ministry is for everyone! Learn who you are as a spiritual being. Figure out how you want to live. Fill your spiritual toolbox.

Your spiritual toolbox holds the practices that keep you grounded, community that supports and encourages you, connections that sustain and challenge you, and resources to keep growing and learning, no matter how old you are!

What do we mean when we say spiritual? Our spirits allow us to love, laugh, cry, pray, sing, wonder, dance, and take care of each other. It's the part of us that seeks out answers to the big questions like...

- What do I hold sacred?
- Where do I feel the presence of something bigger than me?
- Where do I turn when things are too big for me to handle by myself?
- How do I make meaning of my life?

Family ministry programs and classes help you articulate what Unitarian Universalism is. Build a supportive community for your spiritual journey. And deepen your understanding of our values – compassion, justice, love, liberation for all starting with the most marginalized.



Adult Classes on Sunday Mornings
10:15-11:15 a.m. during Middle Hour

We have three tracks for adults on Sunday mornings.

- **Faith in Action (Room 7) – Social Justice.** The third Sunday of every month is the Social Justice Team meeting. Other Sundays rotate through four areas of interest: climate, education, voting, and reproductive rights
- **Faith in Exploration (Room 6) – Lean about Our Faith.** At the Minister Meet-and-Greet on the first Sunday of each month, you can chat with our ministers, staff, and lay leaders. The rest of the month, we rotate through classes about our church, our faith, our symbology, and our small group ministry program.
- **Faith in Practice (Room 5) – Spiritual Practices.** Some of the practices we have shared in this track have been telling our stories through guided art; nurturing gratitude, compassion, and community; and embodied spiritual practices such as a labyrinth, drum circle, and altar building. Stay tuned for what's next!

We also offer adult classes throughout the week, both online and in person, which vary throughout the year.

Children and Youth Classes on Sunday Mornings 10:15-11:15 a.m. during Middle Hour

During Middle Hour, we offer classes for children from pre-K to high school.

- **Sunday Morning Youth Group (Room 7, Grades 6*-12).** Our youth put our values into practice through building community, service projects, and deep discussions about ethics and justice. Relationships are all-important, so we include food, games, and bonding experiences too.
- **UU Activity Lab - Art Explorers (Room 4, Grades 4-6*)**
- **UU Activity Lab - Lego Values (Room 3, Grades 1-3).** Elementary-age children learn what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist through stories, conversations, and hands-on activities. The UU values we teach at this age are kindness, fairness, generosity, interconnectedness, listening, and being open to grow and change.
- **Chalice Children (Room 2, preschool-kindergarten).** Our youngest children hear stories, listen to each other, share activities, and practice being in community with each other. The UU values we teach at this age are compassion, fairness, and caring.

Summer Program: We offer programs year-round! During the summer, we are a little less formal and a lot more playful. Watch for special days like Game Day, Building Day, and Bubble Day!

We mail postcards on a regular basis to our children and teens. We also occasionally send faith development activities to do together at home.



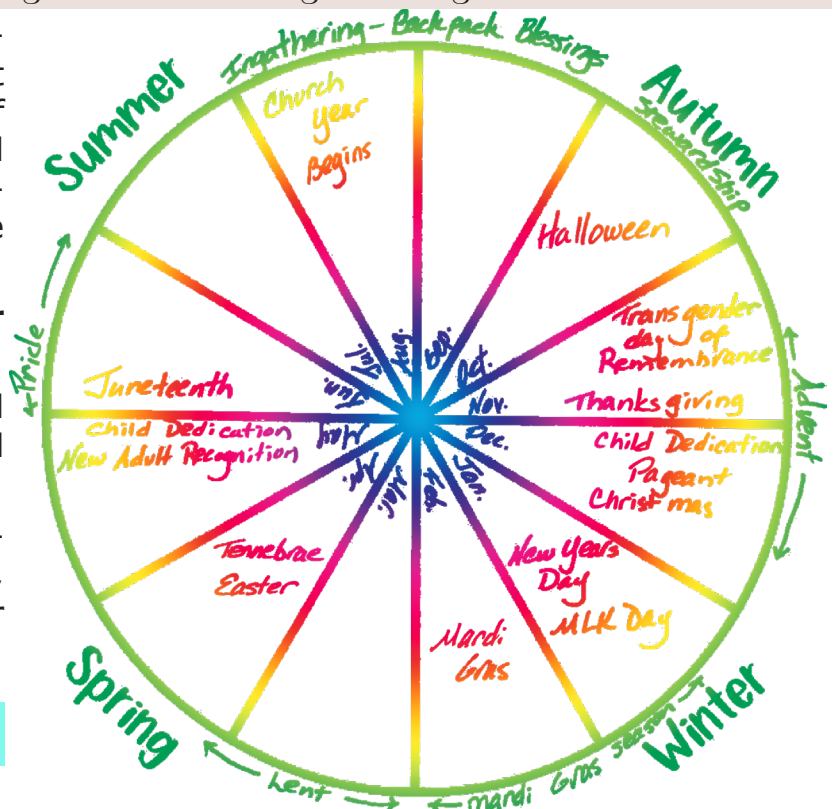
Multi- and Intergenerational Programming

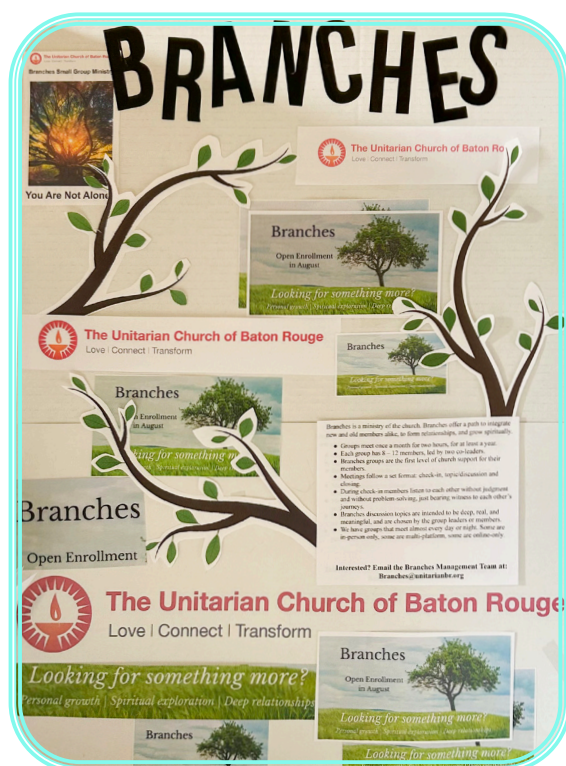
How Can I Help?

There are several ways you can help support and sustain family ministry at the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge.

- Sign up for and attend our classes and programs. (Length of commitment: totally up to you!)
- Help with a one-time project. (Length of commitment: one to two hours on your schedule)
- Help with an ongoing project. (Length of commitment: one to two hours once a month)
- Help with family home ministry. (Length of commitment: one to two hours once a month.)
- Speak at one of our Sunday morning Faith in Practice sessions about a spiritual practice that sustains you. (Length of commitment: one or more Sunday mornings.)



Branches



Branches, our lay-led small-group ministry, deepens and expands our congregation's connections. Open to all members and friends, including those who've attended Introduction to our church or Branches Sampler sessions, these groups meet monthly up to two hours.

Sessions begin with personal check-ins, followed by discussions on topics often drawn from the UUA Small Group Ministry website. Members share and listen respectfully, maintaining confidentiality. Branches groups also provide a first level of care and support when needed. We currently have thirteen active groups.

Social Justice

Our Social Justice Team fosters discussion, reflection, and action on diversity, peace, and justice, with a focus on racial, LGBTQIA+, disability, and environmental justice. We collaborate with organizations like the Center for Common Ground, Together Baton Rouge, VOTE, and Sister Song.

The team selects recipients for our monthly shared offering, dedicating 50% of each Sunday's collection to local

organizations addressing social justice, such as Planned Parenthood Gulf Coast, Louisiana Environmental Action Network, and Diversity House at Youth Oasis.

The team meets during Middle Hour (10:15–11:15 a.m.) on the third Sunday of each month. All are welcome. The Social Justice Team works to highlight various smaller groups that work on climate action, voting rights, reproductive justice and more.



Caring Groups

Congregational Care Team

The Congregational Care Team (CCT) includes about forty volunteers dedicated to meeting the tangible needs of members and their families. The team supports those who are sick or infirm by coordinating with Branches groups and other volunteers, providing meals, transportation, visiting, pet sitting, and grocery shopping.

CCT also oversees card ministries, sending get well, sympathy, or congratulatory messages signed by congregants, as well as holiday cards to homebound members. They coordinate sanc-

tuary flower donations and organize receptions for memorial services.

The team meets bimonthly on the second the second Sunday of odd-numbered months during middle hour.

Pastoral Care Associates

Pastoral Care Associates (PCAs) are a dedicated group of trained volunteers who assist the ministers in offering pastoral support to our congregation. Led by Rev. Meredith Barber, Minister of Congregational Life, their ministry is rooted in confidentiality and presence. PCAs provide support during times of need, such as pre-surgery visits, hospital stays, or mourning the loss of loved ones. They act as trusted liaisons between the congregation, ministers, and other care teams.

While not professional counselors, PCAs offer compassionate support under the guidance of the ministers.

In the Listening Room, a PCA is available every Sunday after the first service, providing a safe space to listen and offer support. Located next to the Fellowship Hall, it's open to anyone — no crisis required. Sometimes, it helps to talk things through.



Disaster Response Team



The Disaster Response Team (DRT) provides a caring presence to church members before, during, and after disasters. The team identifies resources and recruits volunteers in preparation for events and assesses needs to provide support afterward.

Disaster response is a collective effort across the church. Core members meet to plan, the ministry team offers guidance, staff handles communication and administrative support, and Phone Tree callers check in with members during natural

disasters. The entire congregation helps by completing the DRT Resource Survey and volunteering resources and services.

The DRT is seeking additional volunteers, including Phone Tree Callers (who check in with up to 10 members before and after a disaster) and Resource Data Managers (who maintain an electronic list of volunteers and resources).



Serving the Congregation

Membership Team

The Membership Team, led by the Minister of Congregational Life, is dedicated to growing and retaining a culturally diverse and engaged community at the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge. We aim to create a sense of belonging for all who share Unitarian Universalist values, working alongside ministers, staff, the board, and volunteers to foster lifelong faith development.



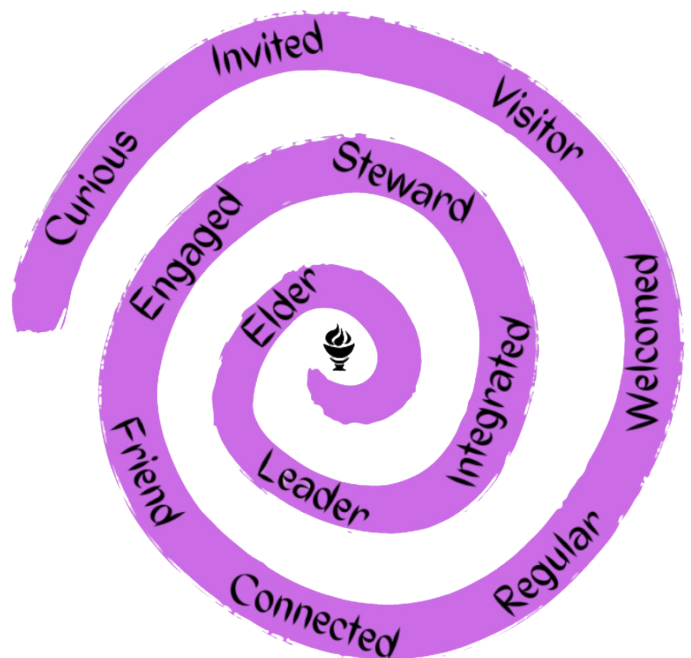
Our team promotes discussions on welcoming, hospitality, and the need for growth to ensure the church's sustainability. We equip members, volunteers, and leaders with the tools to support the church's long-term vitality, transforming our congregation from a group of individuals into an interdependent web of diverse communities.

The Membership Team also supports outreach efforts to curious seekers, cultivating a welcoming environment for people of all backgrounds, identities, and abilities. We aim to make the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge a dynamic, self-sustaining community that is open to all, while recognizing that some may remain friends of the church rather than members.

Our work spans the entire lifecycle of faith formation, from cradle to grave, and includes:

- Embracing children and families.
- Attracting and welcoming guests.
- Creating a pathway to belonging for all.
- Facilitating volunteerism and lay leadership.
- Supporting engagement from youth through end of life.

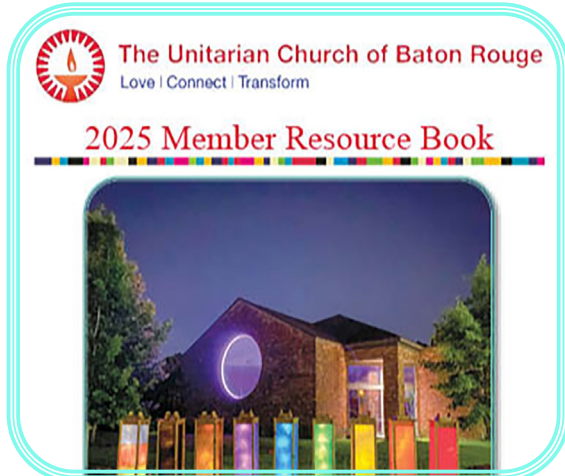


Subgroups of the Membership Team

COM-unity Team

The COM-Unity liaison includes the Communications, Outreach, and Marketing Teams.

Communications Team



This team works closely with the Communications Staff to ensure effective messaging and information flow between the church and its members, while also managing the church's social media presence.

The team's goal is to create a centralized, up-to-date communication system that serves both volunteers and members. By collaborating with Marketing and Outreach, they aim to increase the church's visibility and extend its message to the wider community, including through social media platforms.

Outreach and Marketing Team

The Outreach and Marketing Team connects the church to the broader community, including the Unitarian Universalist Association, Louisiana UU congregations, and local interfaith organizations.

The team works to raise awareness of the church and its mission in Baton Rouge, making it easier for people to find us. They facilitate community service through volunteer activities and ensure timely news releases about church events are shared with the media.



This team is also responsible for creating, communicating, and delivering programs and promotions that provide value to our constituents, including seekers, guests, members, partners, and the broader community. This includes publicity, targeted advertising, and branding efforts.

Welcoming and Hospitality

Ushers and Welcomers

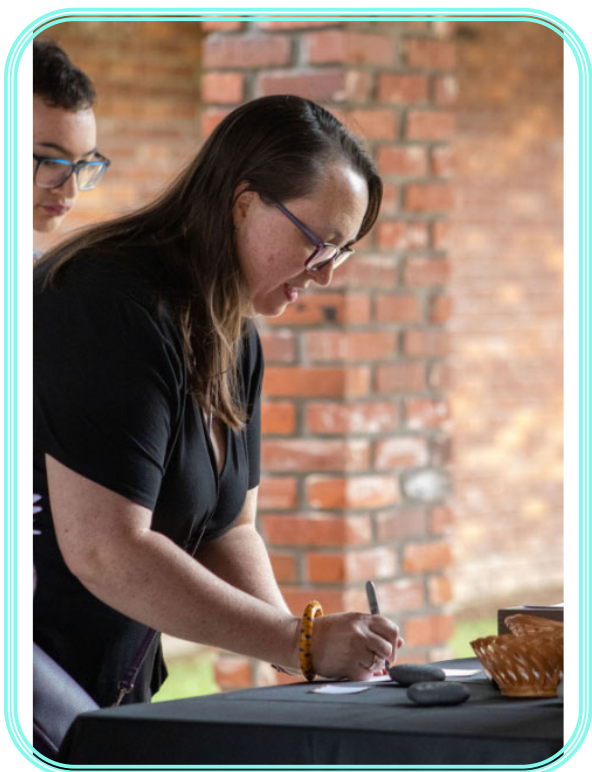
Ushers and Welcomers staff the Welcome Table and assist with ushering at Sunday services and memorial services as needed.

As the first point of contact for new visitors, they are trained to greet everyone with a warm smile and are ready to answer questions. The Welcome Table offers simple UU literature and a sign-up sheet for guests interested in learning more about the church.

Ushers greet attendees at the sanctuary entrance, provide preemptive hospitality by anticipating accessibility needs, and collect, count, and secure the offerings.



Hosts and Greeters



We all serve as greeters focusing on relationship-building and sharing information before services, while also inviting attendees to gather for refreshments and conversation after the service.

Hosts are responsible for setting up refreshments and preparing the space for post-service gatherings. Their primary role, however, is to welcome guests and newcomers in a way that fosters connection and supports our beloved community. Hosts, along with other members of the Welcoming and Hospitality Team, are trained to welcome others in a non-othering way, reflecting our church's mission and values of multiculturalism, anti-oppression, and preemptive hospitality.



Member Engagement and Retention

The Member Engagement and Retention Team collaborates with Faith Development and Family Ministry to accomplish key tasks, including:

- Defining and facilitating the path to membership.
- Orienting, engaging, and retaining members and friends.
- Supporting family ministry and membership classes.
- Tracking membership demographics and metrics.

The team strives to create a clear path to membership, anticipating growth in both numbers and diversity. The welcoming process will support this growth and encourage guests and friends, in accordance with church bylaws, to become members.

This team maintains connections with all members of the church community — adults, children, and youth — through accessible worship, caring, programming, social justice initiatives, small group ministry, and other opportunities for connection. The goal is to ensure that community members rarely leave unless they move or dies, and that those who do leave are always welcomed back when they choose to reconnect.



Caring for Volunteers

This church envisions a day when volunteers share such inspiring stories that enthusiasm spreads naturally, and leaders never need to ask for help. Our goal is a "zero recruitment" culture, where volunteers are fully supported, empowered in their roles, and feel a strong sense of community and purpose. We aim to create a church that attracts motivated volunteers and builds a system that develops leaders and plans for succession.

Developing Leaders

This subteam of the Membership Team collaborates with the Nominating Committee to fill leadership volunteer positions and plan for succession.

Generosity Team

The Generosity Team, guided by the Ministry Team Leader, focuses on the long-term stewardship of the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge. The goal is to cultivate a culture of generosity where members:

- Are financially proficient, informed about church finances, and comfortable discussing money.
- Joyfully participate in stewardship drives, fundraising events, and capital campaigns.
- Have opportunities for planned giving and endowment contributions.
 - Can connect the congregation's mission to its resources.



The team collaborates with ministers, staff, board, and volunteer leaders to foster an abundance mindset — focused on vision, opportunity, trust, gratitude, and long-term growth. If this resonates with you, consider joining one of our task groups.

FUNdraising Team



The FUNdraising Team organizes events that celebrate community, honor volunteer efforts, and support key areas of the church's budget, all while aligning with our mission, vision, and values. Events include the UU Auction, Easter Hat Rental, Garden Sale, Art & Jewelry Sale, QUUeer Fête, and more. The team is also exploring residual income opportunities, such as T-shirt sales.



Education

The Education Team facilitates conversations and learning opportunities about the culture of money within our church and our lives. Past topics have included budgeting, saving, giving, and receiving. Share with the team what you'd like to learn more about regarding money matters.



Stewardship Team

The Stewardship Team leads the annual budget drive campaign, including campaign design, planning, and communicating our mission in relation to giving. If this resonates with you, get in touch.



Data Management

The Data Management Team reviews data systems and develops strategies to effectively manage and utilize information. If you have tech skills or enjoy working with data, let the team know!

Planned Giving

The Planned Giving Team is developing a legacy giving program to help members include the church in their estate planning, supporting future generations and strengthening our financial reserves. Buildings and Grounds

Maintaining our church requires professional services, but many tasks — like changing light bulbs, cleaning gutters, trimming branches, and repairing broken hinges — are made possible through the volunteer efforts of our congregation. Your talents and willingness to assist with these everyday tasks are a special ministry and greatly appreciated.

Allison Hall, the Congregational Administrator, manages routine contractor services (lawn care, AC maintenance, custodial services), maintains a list of contractors, and calls upon volunteers as needed.

Archives

The Archives Team preserves the history of our church through words and artifacts. This includes maintaining records from weekly Orders of Service, bulletins, newsletters, and announcements,

which serve as references for worship planning. The team works closely with Becky Cureau to safeguard photos, books, plaques, banners, newspaper clippings, and other materials documenting our church's life from its founding to the present.

In 2015, the team organized the archives room, which houses materials previously stored in boxes from former ministers and administrators.



The archives room, located next to the Lending Library, is open for visitors.

Please do not remove any items, as they are often one-of-a-kind. Donations of photos and documents from personal collections are welcome. Special thanks to Connie Holmes for creating the Finding Index spreadsheet, which is updated as new items are added. This index will help locate specific documents in the future.



Blood Drive



The Blood Drive is a community outreach effort where our members and friends donate blood to support the greater Baton Rouge area. Blood drives are held three times a year at the church, or individuals can donate at the OLOL Blood Center. Donations of red cells, platelets, and plasma help both children and adults in need.

Additionally, our OLOL Family Blood Group Plan ensures that blood units are available for church family members and friends who need replacements after a transfusion. Requests for replacements can be made to the chairperson, who will release the units as needed.



Affinity Groups

Open Circle Book Club



The Open Circle Book Club is open to all and meets at 7:00 p.m. on the first Sunday of each month in person. Women's Book Club also uses Zoom.

Women's Book Club

The Women's Book Club meets monthly, on the second Monday at 7:00 p.m. at the church and on Zoom. Book selections are made annually at the September meeting. The person who recommends a book serves as the presenter, followed by a group discussion. New members welcome.

Black Joy Collective

The Black Joy Collective is a supportive gathering space for Black church members, meeting on the first Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. The group fosters opportunities for sharing, learning, understanding, growth, and connection.



Fun and Fellowship

The Fun and Fellowship Team continues our tradition of organizing after-church Lunch Bunch gatherings at local restaurants. Open to all members and guests, these informal lunches offer a relaxed setting to build friendships and strengthen community. For new members and guests, attending Lunch Bunch is a great way to connect with others in the congregation.

Lunch Bunch events are announced in the bulletin emails and during Sunday services. Reservations are made for 1 p.m. following the second service.

Guided Meditation

Blue Lotus Meditation Center holds meditation sessions at UCBR on Wednesdays and Saturdays.



Sixth Source Sharing Circle

The Sixth Source Sharing Circle is a gathering for members practicing earth-centered traditions to come together, share experiences, and learn from each other. The group embraces a community "stone gumbo" approach, where everyone contributes their knowledge and insights. The space is open to all, whether you are curious, an experienced practitioner, or a beginner. Meetings are held on the second Sunday of each month, following the second service.



Retirement Support Group

The Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge Retirement Support Group focuses on providing support for retirees. The group meets on the first Thursday of each month at 10 a.m. at Le Madelaine on Jefferson Highway. Meetings typically last two hours. Some members continue the conversation over lunch. Members share information about upcoming events, recommend contractors, and discuss great places to visit. All retirees are welcome to join.



The Women's Circle +

The Women's Circle + is an inclusive gathering of women and older youth that takes its name from our church's big circle window and the poem by Edwin Markam that inspired it. It is way for all women, cis gender and trans women, nonbinary, intersex, and gender-expansive people who are comfortable in a space that centers on lived feminine/femme experiences to come together to connect, share, and support one another in the work of building Beloved Community.



In 1987, our church was among the first to offer Cakes for the Queen of Heaven, a curriculum in feminist theology, created in support of the 1976 Women and Religion Resolution. The Women's Circle builds on that legacy.

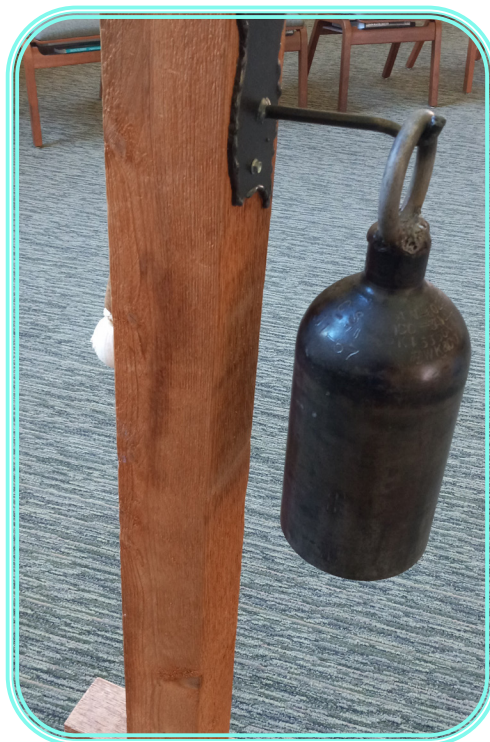
The Compassionate Friends

Governance Organizational Overview



Our church operates under a Policy Governance model, where leadership is a shared responsibility among the congregation, the Board of Trustees, and the Ministry Team. Congregation members play an integral role in discerning the church's mission and organizing to fulfill it. The church is not owned by individuals or groups for personal benefit, but is held in trust for the broader community, both now and in the future.

Leadership duties, aside from those specifically reserved for the congregation as outlined in the Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and Governance Policy Manual, are delegated to the Board of Trustees and the Ministry Team Leader (MTL). Our church's bylaws and Governance Policy Manual are available in the members' area of the website, and copies of Board meeting minutes can be reviewed in the church office.

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees consists of seven voting members and the Senior Minister/Ministry Team Leader. Board members serve three-year terms, with the President and Vice President serving one-year terms. These leadership positions are filled by current board members who have completed at least one year of their term. Board members are elected by the congregation. The Board typically meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m.



The board exists to serve the mission of the church, which currently is stated as follows:

Grounded in love and respect for nature and humanity and dedicated to the individual's search for truth.

We provide a home where we can celebrate spiritual diversity and commit ourselves to serving the human community.

The Board of Trustees, in part, conducts its governance responsibilities through standing board committees that include Finance, Governance, and Personnel Committees.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee supports the Board by providing careful oversight, reviewing financial policies, and facilitating communication on financial matters. Its responsibilities include:

- Reviewing church financial policies and recommending changes as needed.
- Overseeing and reconciling all church funds, including bank accounts, capital fund drives, memorial funds, stocks, asset sales, and the endowment.
- Coordinating an audit of internal financial procedures on behalf of the Board.
- Holding educational sessions to ensure the Board understands the congregation's financial status and goals.
- Ensuring routine financial reports are clear and useful.



The committee consists of three to five members: the MTL (or designee), at least one Board member, and additional members appointed by the Board President. The Committee Chair is designated by the Board President. Committee membership should balance skills and experience in finance and financial management, as well as an understanding of the church's mission and goals.

Governance Committee

The Governance Committee supports the Board by providing oversight, reviewing, and proposing policies, and facilitating communication on governance matters. Its responsibilities include:

- Creating, reviewing, and updating church policies and bylaws to ensure internal consistency.
- Holding annual educational sessions for lay leaders to ensure understanding of the congregation's governance structure.
- Serving as an in-house resource to clarify roles and responsibilities for staff and lay leaders.

The committee consists of three to five members: the President of the Board, the MTL (or designee), and up to five additional members appointed by the Board President. The Board President also designates the Committee Chair. Committee membership should balance skills and experience in governance, understanding the church's history and policies, and knowledge of its mission and goals.

Personnel Committee

The Personnel Committee supports the Board by monitoring, reviewing, and proposing policies related to personnel matters and practices. Its responsibilities include:

- Reviewing new church policies in relation to existing personnel policies and proposing changes as necessary.
- Coordinating periodic audits of Human Resource procedures on behalf of the Board.
- Conducting periodic compensation studies and making recommendations for adjustments to the Board regarding compensation scales.
- Holding educational sessions at least biannually to ensure Board members have a thorough understanding of the congregation's personnel policies and goals.



The committee consists of three to five members, including the MTL, at least one Board member, and additional members appointed by the President from the congregation. The Board President designates the Committee Chair. Committee membership should balance knowledge and experience in human resources or personnel management, along with an understanding of the church's mission and goals.

Treasurer

The Treasurer is an officer of the church, serving at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees. While not a Board member, the Treasurer plays a crucial role as the primary fiscal monitor for the Board. This position requires expertise in finance, accounting, auditing, budgeting, long-term forecasting, and strategic planning. Strong communication and management skills are essential for this role. The Treasurer is a member of the Finance Committee and works closely with various committees, evaluating staff financial operations as needed and collaborating with the Ministry Team Leader on all financial matters. A BA, MBA, CPA, or similar professional finance designation is highly preferred.

Key responsibilities include ensuring the fiscal health of the Church Corporation, understanding and complying with the

congregation's financial policies and relevant government laws. The Treasurer provides financial oversight for all church funds and fiscal activities, including:

- Reviewing bank statements, deposits, payments, checks, timecards, and online transactions.
- Conducting monthly reviews of the operating budget and balance sheet.
- Monitoring income and expenses in coordination with the Finance Committee, the Church Administrator, the bookkeeper, and the Generosity Team.
- Providing financial reports to the Board and congregation.
- Assisting in the development and presentation of the annual operating budget to the congregation.

The Board establishes and maintains standing independent committees, such as the Nominating Committee and Healthy Congregation Committee, which operate independently of the Board's supervision. Members of these committees are elected by the congregation.

Nominating Committee



The Nominating Committee consists of six members elected to three-year terms, plus the Senior Minister or a designee. Committee members must have been members of the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge for at least two years, with at least one member being a past Board of Trustees member. Two members are elected annually at the April membership meeting.

The Ministry Team Leader convenes the committee at least one month prior to

the April meeting to select a chair, and will notify the Board of the chairperson. The committee assists the Ministry Team Leader and Board in identifying qualified candidates for Board member, Board officer, and committee positions, and publishes a slate of candidates.

At the request of the President, the Nominating Committee will also propose candidates for vacancies that arise during the year.

Healthy Congregation Committee



The Healthy Congregation Committee (HCC) was established in 2018 to support church members, friends, and staff in living in covenant and promoting healthy interactions. It provides a way to address disruptive behavior and improve the culture surrounding conflict, ensuring the Unitarian Church of

Baton Rouge approaches conflict in a healthy manner that encourages openness, respect, communication, healthy debate, and collaboration.

Responsibilities of the HCC include:

- Resolving disputes and interpersonal conflicts when necessary and appropriate, in line with the Conflict and Disruptive Behavior Resolution Policy.
- Developing and facilitating programs to enhance the church's ability to manage conflicts and promote communication before issues escalate.
- Serving as a resource for church members, friends, and staff to address conflicts and grievances healthily.

The HCC is composed of three members elected by the congregation for three-year terms, with a church Minister serving as an ex officio member. No prior training is required, but each member must be committed to the mission of the church, the values of Unitarian Universalism, and demonstrate respect, honesty, and kindness in all interactions.
